

Intermediate Composition and Literature

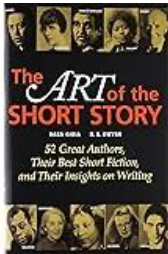

Tuition: \$160/year (\$80 due at registration; \$80 due on the first day of classes)

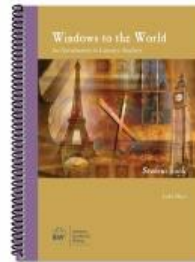
Course Description: The goal of this course is for students to gain a more sophisticated appreciation of literature and to discern whether an author's worldview conforms to a Biblical worldview. Students will annotate short stories, analyzing literary elements such as characterization, plot, theme, setting, structure, and conflict. In addition to writing MLA-formatted literary responses and essays, composing a poetry portfolio, and building a lexicon, students will participate in a Socratic seminar and a mock trial.

Requirements and Expectations: This class is suitable for 10th through 12th-grade students who have completed a basic composition course and are competent in writing coherent, grammatically-correct essays. Students must be able to type their own assignments and must have reliable access to the internet and a printer. Students should expect to spend at least four hours per week outside of class to complete assignments.
